A 20-YEAR JOURNEY SAVING ASIA'S DOGS AND CATS

As we celebrate Soi Dog Foundation's 20th anniversary, we invite you to delve into our timeline, showcasing two decades of progress in Asia's animal welfare. This is a journey that we have undertaken hand in hand with you. Whether you're a follower, supporter, donor, rescuer, adopter or volunteer, you have helped Soi Dog become what it is today. Thank you for making it all possible.

2003

THE FOUNDING

Gill and John teamed up with Margot Homburg, and Soi Dog was founded.

With over **70,000** stray dogs roaming the southern island province of Phuket, they began by setting up mobile spay/neuter clinics, marking the beginning of Soi Dog's Catch, Neuter, Vaccinate, Return (CNVR) programme.







2004 TWO HUGE EVENTS

In September, Gill contracted septicaemia while rescuing a dog from a flooded buffalo field. This resulted in the amputation of both lower legs.

In December, the catastrophic Indian Ocean tsunami struck, claiming the lives of thousands, including Gill's best friend, *Leone Cosens*. A huge operation began to rescue, treat and feed the thousands of stray animals affected.

THE POST TSUNAMI YEARS

While still relying heavily on volunteers, Soi Dog – as the only organisation helping stray animals at that time - received a grant from WSPA, enabling the full-time employment of the first vets and rescue officers.

Took on the running of the local government dog pound in return for the use of space to house an increasing number of dogs being rescued.



2011-2013

2005-2007

FLOOD RESCUE, MAJOR CNVR MILESTONE, AND TACKLING THE DOG MEAT TRADE

2011: Hundreds of dogs rescued from catastrophic Bangkok floods and the rebuilding of dog shelters destroyed by the flooding at Phuttamonthon (dog island).

2012: Opened the first small treatment and spay/neuter clinic in Bangkok.

A concerted effort to put an end to the cross-border dog meat trade from Thailand was initiated, and dialogue with the Thai authorities began.

Dogs Trust Worldwide began supporting Soi Dog's CNVR efforts in Phuket.

2013: Two significant milestones were achieved: a decade in operation and the accomplishment of neutering and vaccinating over **50,000** animals since 2003.





MOVING TO MAIKHAO

Moved to a site in the north of Phuket which would become Soi Dog's permanent shelter and clinic facility.

2009-2010 PUPPIES, CATS AND COW SHEDS

Shelter improvements followed in 2009, thanks to support from The American School of The Hague (ASOH), with the construction of the first dedicated puppy enclosure.

A decline in the stray dog population began to see a rise in the stray cat population and ASOH once again helped to create the first Soi Dog cattery.

By the end of 2010, the CNVR programme had reached over **30,000** animals total.





2014

END OF THE DOG MEAT TRADE IN THAILAND AND INTRODUCTION OF THE FIRST ANIMAL WELFARE ACT

The battle against the illegal dog meat trade in Thailand ended in triumph. After dismantling the illegal gangs, saving thousands of dogs and stopping the trade, the work of relocating and rehoming the rescued dogs began.

Thanks to the generous response from Soi Dog supporters, shelters were built in Buriram to house thousands of dogs.

Soi Dog played a leading role in the committee that drafted Thailand's first animal welfare act, the Cruelty Prevention and Welfare of Animal Act, B.E. 2557 (2014). Nearly a decade later, the trade remains illegal in Thailand and has not resurfaced.

2015 NEW LAUNCHES

Soi Dog furthered its animal rehoming mission with the launch of the international partner rescue programme. Partnerships were struck with various rescue and rehoming organisations in North America, and dogs rescued from the meat trade began to make their way to their new homes.



The long-term mobile CNVR programme in Bangkok was established.

Reached the milestone of **100,000** animals neutered and vaccinated.

SECOND NEW BEGINNINGS



Gill's dream of a purpose-built stray dog hospital became a reality when the new facility opened in September.

The sanctuary was expanded, with four new dog enclosures built, and two large fenced play areas for dogs added.



Soi Dog announced a partnership with Dogs Trust Worldwide aimed at growing the CNVR programme in Greater Bangkok.









NEXT MAJOR CNVR MILESTONE

In 2018, Soi Dog expanded its spay/neuter programme with a fifth mobile CNVR team, reaching over **80,000** animals by year-end, and surpassing **250,000** animals neutered and vaccinated since 2003.

The Gill Dalley Sanctuary expanded to over six acres and added eight new dog enclosures. Additionally, Soi Dog rescued and rehomed hundreds of dogs from an emergency situation in Nakhon Phanom.





2018

After a brief illness, Gill Dalley sadly passed away on February 13, an enormous loss to Soi Dog.

2017

In her memory, the Soi Dog shelter was renamed the Gill Dalley Sanctuary.

A SOMBRE YEAR

As Soi Dog attempted to pick up the pieces, it would have to look to the future. The first steps were to launch two more essential initiatives – the community outreach and humane education programmes.

January and February saw severe flooding in Southern Thailand. Soi Dog's newly formed community outreach team, along with its animal rescue officers, were able to provide food to animals in need and ensure medical treatment for the injured.

2019

CNVR, EMERGENCY RESCUE AND DCMT

With support from the Jeanne Marchig Trust and Fondation Brigitte Bardot, Soi Dog opened the first purpose-built stray cat hospital in Asia in November.

The sixth and seventh mobile CNVR teams were launched, and for the first time in a calendar year, **100,000** animals were reached by the CNVR programme.

DCMT: Soi Dog extended its efforts beyond Thailand, continuing to campaign against the dog and cat meat trade in Vietnam. A petition gained more than 1 million signatures. In neighbouring Cambodia, Soi Dog supported the local group End Dog Meat Cambodia.

Soi Dog were there once again to help thousands of flood-affected stray animals, this time in Ubon Ratchathani in the east of Thailand.

HALF A-MILLION THANK YOUS

2020

Thailand's Covid-19 lockdowns and closed borders raised concerns for stray animals and pet abandonment. Soi Dog responded by distributing over **11 tonnes** of food and adding nine new dog enclosures at the sanctuary.

A busy year of sanctuary improvements and expansion saw the opening of the Humane Education Centre – the first of its kind in Asia – as well as the launch of an eighth mobile CNVR team and the construction of an isolation hospital for dogs and cats.

By December, over **half-a-million** animals had been neutered and vaccinated since 2003.

DCMT: Partnered with Animal Rescue Korea to help combat the trade in South Korea









2021

A YEAR OF HUGE CHALLENGES

Soi Dog expanded further, opening four new dog enclosures, four off-lead play areas and, thanks to a generous individual a swimming pool for dogs.

Over **120 tonnes** of food was provided to animals impacted by monsoon flooding in Central Thailand.

The CNVR programme set new records as a ninth mobile team was added and a first overseas CNVR project in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, was launched.

In 2021, a significant challenge emerged when the USA, citing rabies concerns, announced a ban on dogs entering the country from 113 territories around the world, including Thailand. This decision significantly affected the overseas adoption programme.

GROWING AT A RATE OF KNOTS

CNVR: Almost **200,000** animals reached in the year, and the milestone of 800.000 in total. Four more mobile teams added, making 13 overall.

Community Outreach: A third team launched.

Emergency response during heavy monsoon flooding saw the delivery of over 300 tonnes of food to an estimated 64,000 stray animals in Central Thailand.

Eight more communal dog enclosures built, now totalling 51. Each enclosure houses 25 dogs!

Soi Dog supported organisations helping animals affected by the war in Ukraine by providing medical treatment, food and dog houses.



DCMT: The "Last Country on Earth" campaign to end the dog and cat meat trade was launched, and a partnership struck with Luzon-based Animal Kingdom Foundation

fighting the trade in the Philippines.







TWENTY YEARS OF 2023 IMPACT, ONE MILLION **NEUTERED ANIMALS**

This year, Soi Dog is marking not only 20 years of dedicated work but also the **millionth** stray animal neutered through its spay/neuter programme – the largest of its kind in the world.

In addition, significant progress has been made in the fight against the dog and cat meat trade including, in Vietnam, 197 cats rescued from a slaughterhouse and a roundtable discussion held at the top level of government.

Two more mobile CNVR teams launched.

Additional dog enclosures built.

We are deeply grateful to our dedicated supporters who have made this incredible journey possible.

HERE'S TO THE NEXT 20 YEARS!

Undoubtedly, the incredible CNVR news of 2023 is that we have now spayed/neutered and vaccinated more than a million stray animals!

This is the first time in history that this number of stray animals has been neutered and vaccinated by a single organisation, and we could not be more proud to say that organisation is Soi Dog. That the momentous milestone coincided with our 20-year anniversary made it even more special.

Though we shared the news in early September, we continue to celebrate and reflect on this amazing achievement and on those who made it possible: our staff on the ground, our partners in Thailand and beyond and – most importantly – you, our incredible supporters around the world.

From 175 sterilisations in 2003 to 1 million today – it really is incredible what can be achieved when we join together. We owe you a million thank yous!



MILLION, THE ONE-EYED FACE OF HOPE





The puppy you see here was the millionth animal to pass through the programme. Aptly, we named her *Million*.

Million was found on the streets by one of our 15 mobile sterilisation teams. In addition to being spayed and vaccinated, she also needed to be treated for injuries sustained after being hit by a car.

Just a few weeks after introducing you to Million, we were back with the best news of all: she'd found a loving home with long-term volunteer Donna Freelove in the UK, just minutes away from our co-founder John Dalley!



Million has become the face of the milestone as well as a symbol for why we started our CNVR programme back in 2003 and why we haven't stopped for a single day since.

Puppies like Million deserve so much better than to be born into short lives of suffering on the streets, where they face road traffic accidents, disease and cruelty and where every day is a struggle just to survive.

Neutering and vaccinating gets to the root cause of this suffering.

Perhaps you have an idea or a dream of something you would like to do. Just like our CNVR programme: start small, stay consistent and focused and you will be amazed at what can be achieved.



A HEARTWARMING TALE OF UNITY



In the bustling world of the Soi Dog shelter, where the tireless efforts of compassionate individuals make a difference in the lives of countless furry companions, one remarkable installation stands as a symbol of hope, unity and love. A wire sculpture of a dog and cat, crafted with intricate detail and skill, graces the grounds of the Gill Dalley Sanctuary, capturing the hearts of all who pass by.

This custom artwork not only celebrates the unique bond between our canine and feline friends but also serves as a poignant reminder of the vital mission the shelter undertakes daily. Generously funded by long-time Soi Dog supporter Khun *Bright Vachirawat Chivaree* through his Make a Bright Wish initiative, the remarkable sculptures were brought to life by talented Bangkok artist *Pratchaya Uthayanin* of NIANTA Arts Production.

As a passionate animal lover himself, he envisioned a piece of art that would convey the message of solidarity and harmony between dogs and cats, two species often seen as natural adversaries. Collaborating with Soi Dog, he set to work on transforming his vision into reality.



THE CREATION PROCESS

The creation of this awe-inspiring sculpture was a labour of love. Working to designs conceived by Soi Dog, Pratchaya spent countless hours bending and twisting wire into the forms of the dog and cat. Each strand of wire was meticulously crafted to ensure a balance of strength and durability, representing the resilience and adaptability these animals display on their journey towards finding their forever homes.



The intricate details of the sculpture were added with precision. From the gentle curve of the dog's tail to the subtle raising of a feline paw, every aspect of the sculpture captures the essence of our beloved companion animals. The dog and cat were positioned face to face, their eyes locked in a gaze that seems to speak volumes about the bond they share despite their perceived differences.



IMPACT ON THE SHELTER

The sculpture has been welcomed by visitors and volunteers alike, and its presence has sparked conversations about the coexistence of dogs and cats, fostering understanding and appreciation for both species.

Moreover, it is hoped the artwork will become an emblem of the shelter's mission to rescue, care for and rehome animals in need. It serves as a beacon of hope for the animals waiting for their forever homes and a poignant tribute to the dedication of the shelter's volunteers and staff. It also draws attention to the bond between these two animals. The sculpture dispels common myths about their compatibility and will hopefully encourage an even broader perspective on pet adoption.

In a world where art can touch hearts and inspire change, the wire sculpture stands tall (the dog is 2.3 metres high) as a testament to unity and love. It celebrates the unwavering dedication of team Soi Dog: supporters and volunteers the world over and advocates for

STERILISATION AND VACCINATION ACROSS THE NATION!

While the milestone of a million neutered and vaccinated animals is the highlight of 2023, there have been some other exciting developments in the field of CNVR this year that we're excited to share with you.

These developments all saw Soi Dog collaborate with national agencies, demonstrating a growing understanding in Thailand that CNVR really is the way forward.

A VISIT FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF DISEASE CONTROL

In July, we welcomed the Director-General of the Department of Disease Control (DDC) Dr. *Tares Krassanairawiwong* to the Soi Dog shelter in Phuket to discuss collaborating on rabies prevention across Thailand.

THE GILL DALLEY SANCTUARY

At the end of their visit, the DDC kindly donated some medical equipment for use in our hospitals.



Dr. Tares was joined by representatives from the Office of the Prime Minister, the Department of Local Administration Promotion and the Department of Livestock Development. Their visit followed a 'Rabies Network Development' workshop held the week before to discuss establishing Phuket as Thailand's very first rabies-free province.

Top of the agenda, therefore, was our large-scale CNVR programme which is not only contributing to a steady decline in the stray population but is also reducing the spread of communicable diseases, including rabies.

The delegation also learned about other aspects of Soi Dog's work, including treatment, community outreach, education and adoption.

Our CNVR Manager for Phuket Dr. *Saiparn Nattanich Maneewong* spoke in detail about the programme, including how we plan and organise our mobile clinics; how returning animals to their territories helps build herd immunity; and the importance of both accurately recording data and engaging closely with the community in ensuring the continued success of the programme.

There has been just one recorded case of rabies (in a dog) in Phuket since the turn of the century – thanks largely to our CNVR programme – making the province eligible for evaluation as a rabies-free area. If successful, it will be the first of Thailand's 77 provinces to achieve such status – testament to your support.

We'll be sure to keep you updated.

Dr. Saiparn showed the visiting delegation around our on-site sterilisation suite.

A ROYAL RABIES EVENT

Later in July, Soi Dog joined an event in the southern province of Nakhon Si Thammarat as part of Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn Krom Phra Srisavangavadhana's "Disease-Free Animals, Rabies-Free People" project.

The event brought together HRH Princess Chulabhorn's own veterinary volunteer unit as well as local government officials, the nearby Walailak University and ourselves at Wat Phra Mahathat Woramahawihan temple.



Across the course of five days, a total of 242 animals from the temple grounds and surrounding community were neutered and vaccinated. While the overarching goal was to reduce the population of stray dogs and cats in the area and stem the spread of



disease, the government hopes that in doing so it will help the temple achieve UNESCO World Heritage Site status.

We have been proudly supporting HRH Princess Chulabhorn's project in Nakhon Si Thammarat since 2018, working with local government organisations to neuter and vaccinate as many animals as possible. Our two mobile teams move around the province systematically and will continue to do so until they have reached all 23 districts.

Soi Dog's Southern Mobile Manager Dr. Muk Patcharee Pipatdirekkul and her team have not only seen a reduction in the number of stray animals born onto the streets over the past five years, they have also seen people's attitudes towards animals improve.

SIGNED, SEALED, DELIVERED

The end of July (a busy month!) also saw Soi Dog and the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA) sign a memorandum of understanding to cooperate on a project of neutering and vaccinating dogs and cats in the Thai capital, as well as educating and advising the public on rabies prevention and animal welfare.

"We need to admit that the BMA needs help from other groups to handle and care for stray animals. Many parties need to discuss the work process because dog and cat issues are complex. They are a part of society, and we must also consider the surrounding community," said BMA Deputy Governor Prof. *Tavida Kamonvej*.

"Thank you, Soi Dog, for your cooperation. Bangkok is ready to work together," she added.

The BMA is the local government of Bangkok, responsible for everything from transportation, to security, to housing, to the environment, which includes animal health.

With a large population of stray animals in the capital, Bangkok Governor *Chadchart Sittipunt* set out a specific stray animal management policy for the BMA and appointed a committee to assist which consists of various Bangkok agencies, faculties of veterinary medicine and Soi Dog.

We have been operating a programme of CNVR in Bangkok since 2015, neutering and vaccinating over half a million animals so far in partnership with Dogs Trust Worldwide. It's great to have these efforts recognised, and we look forward to building on this work together.

Earlier this year, your incredible support saw a Vietnamese cat slaughterhouse put out of business and 197 cats rescued in what was a milestone moment for animal welfare in Vietnam. (If you missed it, please click *here* to read all about it in the May edition of the *Soi Dog Post*.)

The raid not only gave us an even deeper insight into the cat and dog meat trade in Vietnam, it also put the country's trade back into the international spotlight.

However, vigorous campaigns and media attention alone are not enough to put an end to this heinous trade once and for all. To effect long-term change, it is imperative to understand the human behaviour and psychology involved.

After multiple discussions with our strategic partner Intelligentmedia, we changed our approach and sought to present our findings to the National Assembly of Vietnam. The National Assembly is Vietnam's most powerful legislative body, and it has a significant influence on the creation and execution of the nation's policies, laws and regulations.



After presenting a comprehensive proposal to participate in the National Assembly Round Table (NART), and after engaging in numerous meetings with officials, we were invited to host a roundtable discussion concerning the dog and cat meat trade in Vietnam on July 4th.

Entitled Trading and Consuming Meat from Domesticated Animals (Dogs and Cats): Policies, Challenges, and Opportunities, the roundtable brought together nearly 50 parliamentarians, government officials and specialists from across Vietnamese society.

It was the first time in Vietnam's history that the trade and consumption of dogs and cats had been deliberated upon at this level of government.

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top level of government so that laws and regulations to control the dog and cat meat trade will be further improved and enforced," said Soi Dog Director of International Advocacy *Rahul Sehgal*, pictured above.

RABIES RISING, TOURISM GROWING, ATTITUDES CHANGING

One prominent and promising conversation revolved around the strategy for first developing the capital of Hanoi as a dog and cat meat-free city.

"Hanoi should adopt anti-rabies measures, establish safety zones for vaccinated dogs and strictly control the trade and consumption of dog and cat meat," said Prof. Dr. Nguyen Luong Tam, Deputy Director of Preventive Medicine and Ministry of Health.

"The risk of rabies is obvious if dog control and vaccination is not properly enforced."




Vietnam recorded 55 rabies-related deaths between January and August 2023 across 25 cities and provinces – an increase of 15 cases recorded during the same period last year.

In addition to disease control, concerns were also raised about the damage the dog and cat meat trade has on the tourist image of Hanoi and wider Vietnam.

"Being the cultural heart of Vietnam, it's critical for Hanoi to maintain its prestige as a cultural based, civilised and dynamic city," said the Vice Director of Hanoi Department of Agriculture *Ta Van Tuong*.

"Phasing out dog and cat meat is key to attracting more tourists who are increasingly caring for environmental tourism services and animal welfare conditions."

> Attendees highlighted that to end the practice, it is important to spread awareness as well as educate citizens on health concerns through grassroots campaigns.

> The consensus was clear: it is crucial to put an end to the trade and consumption of dog and cat meat for the welfare of animals, legal compliance, public health and safety and to boost the country's overall image.

We are committed to collaborating closely with government agencies to make this a reality.

Our dedicated advocacy team will not only work with top officials to develop roadmaps and strategies but will also drive grassroots campaigns and educate citizens so that the dogs and cats of Vietnam are no longer subjected to this unimaginable cruelty.

ANOTHER TURNING POINT

Proof that public opinion is already shifting came at a workshop in Hanoi in September with leaders of Vietnam's traditional medicine community who unanimously agreed that dogs and cats should not be used for the purposes of medicine and that a legal framework must be put in place to protect them.

The workshop was organised by Soi Dog, the Professional Department of Vietnam Oriental Traditional Medicine Association (VOTMA) and Intelligentmedia.

Dog and cat meat, bones and other body parts have long been claimed by traditional medicine practitioners to cure everything from asthma to musculoskeletal disorders. However, these claims have proved to be unfounded and based upon unscientific assumptions and superstitions.


> Far from aiding human health, the trade of dogs and cats has been shown to put consumers at risk of parasitic diseases, bacterial infections and rabies.

The workshop closed with a pledge by VOTMA to refrain from using dog and cat meat in their practices and to actively educate their peers and patients that there is no scientific evidence of its claimed medicinal qualities.

> This development demonstrates the real impact your support is making and highlights the importance of working with all sectors of society to bring this trade to an end.


After much deliberation, Soi Dog co-founder John Dalley chose the following design by UK-based *Ewelina Jaskolska* as the winner!





UN RECOGNISES PROTECTION FROM VIOLENCE AGAINST ANIMALS AS PART OF CHILD RIGHTS

August saw a major breakthrough for global animal welfare at the highest level.

The need for children to be protected from exposure to violence against animals was adopted into the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), elevating animal rights into the human rights domain for the first time in history.

The UNCRC – a legally binding agreement which sets out the rights of children in 196 nations around the world – now officially reads:

> Children must be protected from all forms of physical and psychological violence and from exposure to violence, such as domestic violence or violence inflicted on animals.

> General Comment No. 26, Right to freedom from all forms of violence (art. 19), UNCRC.



A groundbreaking moment for animal welfare, it marks the first time that animal abuse has been referenced in a Human Rights Charter of the United Nations, and all 196 nations who are signatory are strictly obligated to comply.

You were part of this incredible change.

In May, thanks to your support, we published a report – known as the LINK Study – into the dog and cat meat trade in Vietnam which showed the undeniable link between animal-directed violence in society and its negative psychological impact on children exposed to it.

The report was conducted by professors from the Social Work Department of Vietnam National University in Hanoi and presented to the United Nations for their consideration regarding the inclusion of animal rights in the UNCRC. The *LINK Study* summary reads:

Animal and child welfare experts highlight that governmentsanctioned exposure of children to animal-directed violence may be a form of psychological violence against the youth themselves.

There is evidence – across countries – which demonstrates how cruelty can adversely impact not only the animals as victims, but also individuals and the larger community. Therefore, if governments choose to ignore or condone exposure to violence, despite having knowledge of the dire psychosocial consequences for youth exposed to animal cruelty, it can be argued their actions – or inactions – may constitute a violation of basic human rights.

But the impact doesn't stop at ending the dog and cat meat trade. The agreement can be used to bring an end to a whole host of other inhumane animal practices around the world, such as bullfighting, trophy hunting, ritual sacrifices and the public slaughter of homeless animals as a means of managing overpopulation.

We firmly intend to hold the necessary governments to account as part of our continued campaigns to combat animal cruelty. No child should witness violence against animals, and no animal should be subjected to such violence in the first place.
